Introduction

Since many have undertaken to compile an orderly narrative of the events that have been fulfilled among us, just as those who from the beginning were eyewitnesses and ministers of the word have handed them down to us, I too, having carefully investigated everything from the beginning, decided to write it down for you in an orderly sequence, most excellent Theophilus, so that you may know the certainty of the things you have been taught.

Elizabeth and Zechariah conceive their son John

the days of Herod, king of Judea, there was a priest named Zechariah, of the division of Abijah. He had a wife named Elizabeth, a descendant of Aaron. Both of them were righteous before God, walking blamelessly in all the commandments and precepts of the Lord. But they had no children, because Elizabeth was barren and both were advanced in years.

It happened that, while he was serving before God, in the division of his division, he was chosen by lot, according to the custom of the priestly service, to enter the Sanctuary of the Lord to burn incense. The whole multitude of the people was outside in prayer at the hour of incense.

The angel of the Lord appeared to him, standing at the right side of the altar of incense. When Zechariah saw him, he was troubled, and fear gripped him.

The angel said to him:

"Do not be afraid, Zechariah, for your prayer has been heard; your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you shall name him John; he will be a joy and delight to you, and many will rejoice at his birth, for he will be great in the sight of the Lord. He will never take wine or other fermented drink, and he will be filled with the Holy Spirit even from his mother's womb. He will turn many of the people of Israel to the Lord their God and go on before him in the spirit and power of Elijah, to turn the hearts of the parents to their children and the disobedient to the wisdom of the righteous—to make ready a people prepared for the Lord.

Zechariah said to the angel:

"How will I recognize him? For I am old and my wife is advanced in years."

The angel answered, "I

am Gabriel, who stands in the presence of God, and I have been sent to speak to you and to bring you this good news. Now you will be mute and unable to speak."

The people were waiting for Zechariah and were surprised by his delay at the Sanctuary.

When he came out, he could not speak to them, and they realized that he had seen a vision in the sanctuary; he made signs to them, but remained mute.

Days later, his wife Isabel conceived; and she remained hidden for five months, saying:

"This is what the Lord has done for me in the days when he was pleased to take away my reproach among men."

Annunciation of Jesus Christ to Mary

In the sixth month, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee, to a virgin pledged to be married to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David. The virgin's name was Mary. The angel went to her and said:

"Rejoice, full of grace, the Lord is with you."

Mary answered the angel,

"How can this be, since I am a virgin?"

The angel answered,

"The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God. And behold, your relative Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son, and this is the sixth month for her who was called barren, for nothing is impossible with God."

Mary said,

"Behold, I am the servant of the Lord; let it be done to me according to your word."

And the angel left her.

Mary's visit to her cousin Elizabeth

In those days Mary arose and went with haste into the hill country, to a town in Judah; she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth.

And it came to pass, when Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, that the baby leaped in her womb, and Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit; and she exclaimed with a loud voice,

"Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb! And why is this granted to me that..."

"May the mother of my Lord come to me? For as soon as the sound of your greeting reached my ears, the baby in my womb leaped for joy. Blessed is she who has believed that the Lord would fulfill his promises to her!"

And Mary said:

"My soul magnifies the Lord
and my spirit rejoices in God my savior
because he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his
servant; therefore, from now on all generations will call me blessed,
For the Mighty One has done great things for me, holy is his name, and his mercy
extends to those who fear him from generation to generation.
He displayed the strength of his arm;
he scattered those who are proud in their own hearts.
He brought down the powerful from their thrones and exalted the humble.
He has filled the hungry with good things and sent the rich away empty.
He has helped his servant Israel, remembering his mercy.
- as I had announced to our parents -
in favor of Abraham and his descendants forever."

Birth of John the Baptist

The time came for Elizabeth to give birth, and she had a son.

Her neighbors and relatives heard that the Lord had shown her great mercy, and they rejoiced with her. On the eighth day they came to circumcise the child, and they wanted to name him after his father, Zechariah, but his mother spoke up and said:

"No; his name must be Juan."

They told him:

"There's no one in your family with that name."

And they made signs to his father, asking what he wanted to be called. He asked for a writing tablet and wrote:

"His name is John."

And they were all amazed. Immediately his mouth was opened and his tongue loosed, and he began to speak, praising God. Fear came upon all his neighbors, and throughout the hill country of Judea all these things were talked about; all who heard them pondered them in their hearts, saying:

"So what will this child be?"

For indeed the hand of the Lord was with him.

Zechariah's Prayer

Zechariah, his father, was filled with the Holy Spirit, and prophesied, saying:

"Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, for he has visited and redeemed his people. He has raised up for us a horn of salvation in the house of his servant David, as he promised through his holy prophets of old, to save us from our enemies and from the hand of all who hate us; to show mercy to our ancestors and to remember his holy covenant, the oath he swore to our father Abraham, to grant us that we, being delivered from the hand of our enemies, might serve him without fear, in holiness and righteousness before him all our days. And you, child, will be called prophet of the Most High; for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways, to give his people knowledge of salvation through the forgiveness of their sins, because of the tender mercy of our God, by which a light from on high will visit us, to shine on those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace."

The child grew and became strong in spirit; he lived in the deserts until the day he appeared publicly to Israel.

The Birth of Jesus in Bethlehem

In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration when Quirinius was governor of Syria. And all went to be registered, each to his own town. And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the town of Nazareth, to Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage of David, to be registered with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. And while they were there, the time came for her to give birth, and she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in swaddling cloths and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn.

Announcement to the pastors

In that same region there were shepherds living out in the fields, keeping watch over their flocks by night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified.

Moved by the Spirit, he went into the Temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what the Law required, he took him in his arms and blessed God, saying:

"Now, Lord, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all nations, a light to enlighten the Gentiles and the glory of your people Israel."

His father and mother were amazed at what was said about him.

Simeon blessed them and said to Mary, his mother:

"This child is destined to cause the falling and rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign of the coming of the Lord."

Solomon was the father of Rehoboam;

Rehoboam, the father of Abijah;

Abijah, the father of Asaph;

Asaph, the father of Jehoshaphat;

Jehoshaphat, the father of Joram;

Joram, the father of Uzziah.

Ozias was the father of Joatham;

Joatham, father of Ahaz; Ahaz,

father of Hezekiah; Hezekiah,

father of Manasseh.

Manasseh was the father of Amos;

Amos, the father of Josiah;

Josiah, the father of Jeconiah and his brothers, during the exile in Babylon.

After the exile in Babylon:

Jeconiah was the father of Shealtiel;

Salatiel, father of Zerubbabel;

Zerubbabel, father of Abiud;
Abiud, father of Eliakim;
Eliakim, father of Azor.

Azor was the father of Zadoc;
Zadok, father of Aquim;
Aquim, father of Eliud;
Eliud, father of Eleazar;
Eleazar, father of Matán;
Matthan, father of Jacob.

Jacob was the father of Joseph, the husband of Mary, of whom was born Jesus, who is called Christ.

The total number of generations is therefore: from Abraham to David, fourteen generations; from David to the exile in Babylon, fourteen generations; from the exile in Babylon to Christ, fourteen generations.

The virgin conception and the birth of Jesus.

This is how the birth of Jesus Christ came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit. Joseph, her husband, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, resolved to divorce her quietly. But as he was considering this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said:

"Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins."

All this happened so that what the Lord had announced through the Prophet:

"The Virgin will conceive
and she will give birth to a son whom they will name
the name Emanuel,
which translated means: "God with us".

When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him: he took Mary into his home, and although they had not lived together, she gave birth to a son, and he named him Jesus.

The visit of the Magi

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, during the reign of Herod, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem and asked, "Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him."

And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod's palace, they returned to their country by another way.

because they no longer exist."

The return from Egypt.

When Herod died, an angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph, who was in Egypt, and said to

him, "Get up, take the child and his mother, and return to the land of Israel, for those who sought the child's life are dead."

Joseph got up, took the child and his mother, and went into the land of Israel. But when he learned that Archelaus was reigning in Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there and, warned in a dream, withdrew to the region of Galilee, where he settled in a city called Nazareth. Thus was fulfilled what had been foretold through the prophets: He will be called a Nazarene.
